



BUY AN AUSTIN & BANISH CARE.

DO YOU HAVE A HISTORIC VEHICLE CONDITIONALLY REGISTERED THROUGH THE AUSTIN 7 CLUB?

If so, annually, you must sign a Statutory Declaration in front of a JP stating that your vehicle has not suffered any modification from both the original inspection MR334 and the conditions set out in the Code of Practice. (C of P available from the clubrooms). The Club will not update an existing or issue you with a new Log Book unless the Statutory Declaration is produced to the Club Registrar.

Members are advised that if your log book is not kept up to date with your current membership and annual statutory declaration, your historic vehicle is effectively, not driveable on the road, even though the registration may not have expired.

Members must pay their club subscription before 31 December each year to ensure continuity of membership and ability to drive their historic vehicle.

Your Vehicle must be inspected by a Club Authorised officer once in a three year period. This will ideally be done at the issue of a new log book.

The Club requests that you carry out any Austin 7 log book business at the many opportunities available at the Clubrooms.

Please do your part to preserve the integrity of this conditional registration system we are privileged to have through our Austin 7 Club.



The club's congratulations must go to Ian (Doc) Jones, Ian (Revs) Motley and Gwilym Henry-Edwards the three Austin 7 drivers, and of course the back up crew without who's help it would have not all be possible. Of course there are other numerous people both in and out of the club who contributed to the success of the venture and to these people we must also add our thanks, particularly the birthday committee who came up with the original idea.

The return of the Austin 7's coincided with our 21st Birthday dinner (3 x 7 = 21) held at the Morphett Arms Hotel and would be one of the best in the history of the club. It was nice to see a large party from the Sporting Car Club to help us celebrate. Everyone enjoyed themselves and the floor show by "Long Arms" Dillon - our thanks to the social committee. The Austin 7 owners were entertained at their last meeting by John Walsh, who used to race most successfully an Austin 7 back in the Port Wakefield days."...

As reported in the Austin 7 Journals July 1974

'The Austin 7 Club Ayers Rock team were flagged off from Victoria Square by Chief Secretary, Mr. Kneebone, on the morning of June 1st after many nights of frantic preparations at Ian Jones' Prospect Stable and a last minute engine swap by Ian Motley.

The send-off was terrific - the team appreciated the support of all those who turned out and the cars that provided an escort out of the city and as far as Port Augusta.

The weather throughout was perfect, day after day of bright, sunny, cloudless skies. The night generally were freezers but were tolerable with plenty of blankets. The roads were better than we dared to expect. The effects of the big rains could be seen everywhere, but wherever the road was badly cut up or still under water, there was always a loop around that section.

Corrugations were our worst enemy. Some could be taken at 30-35mph, but the deeper ones threw the cars all over the road and they had to be negotiated at 20mph or lower.

Early in the piece Gwilym Henry-Edwards' car was shedding bolts almost faster than we could replace them, and on two separate occasions the hood on Ian Jones' car threatened to part company with the car when windscreen supports fractured right through.

The Austin 7's did a marvellous job. Worst moments were Gwilym Henry-Edwards' broken half shaft and Ian Jones' broken crank on consecutive days. However, those problems were both overcome and the trip continued. In fairness it should be pointed out that both breakages were found to have resulted at already cracked sections and Ian Jones wasn't driving when his went!

Two days from home on the return trip Ian Jones car lost all power and was found to have four burnt out exhaust valves. Unperturbed, Ian performed an instant valve grind using Heather Lane's toothpaste.

Readers will note no mention of Ian Motley's car - he spent most of the trip waiting for something to blow up and is still trying to work out why it didn't give trouble! Apart from a loose flywheel at Ayers Rock it went like a rocket for the 2400 miles. The publicity received was tremendous and the Club and the sponsors, Shell, Spartan Paints, John Mack Cameras, Edgells and Port Carriers received wonderful promotion.

The climax came when at exactly 10.30am 21 days after the start, the team of three Austin 7's and two support vans arrived at the Shell Station on the corner of West Terrace and Grote Street to be greeted by crowds of people, TV cameras, radio interviewers, the lot! A truly memorable finish to a memorable event.

The thanks of the team go to those people who helped make the trip possible, the sponsors, those who helped with preparations at Ian Jones' place and Margaret and Trevor Mander and Bruce Bridgart who brought up fresh supplies at the end of the first week.

Special thanks go to Heather Lane (cook), and Trevor Knuckey and Colin Hanks who spent most of the trip driving the very essential support vans.

Austin 7 owners: Ian Motley, Ian Jones, and Gwilym Henry-Edwards, plus Heather Lane, Trevor Knuckey, Colin Hanks, Mike Talbot, Geoff Kain, Stephen Sneesby and Ron Burchett."

50 YEARS AGO



I'm afraid that you will have to be a bit indulgent of me for a moment as 50 years ago on 14 August 1965 I bought my 1935 Austin 10 (pictured above) from J.K. Stump Ltd for £34 (Jim Stump thought it was a '34 Austin Ten hence the price) and it's still going strong having recently completing a 620 mile round trip to Penola & Casterton on the 2015 Austin 7 Club Border Run.

When purchased, the Austin Ten had done 30,000 miles and the motor was in a very poor state using well over a gallon of oil (Used sump oil) on each of the Border Runs in the late 70's. The previous owner was a Miss Alma Noreen Conaghty who lived at 22 King William St Kent Town and the whole underside of the car was caked in hardened road mud rendering the brakes unworkable and all grease points ungreaseable. The paintwork was worn out as it was assumed the vehicle was washed on a weekly basis after travelling an average of only 1,000 miles per annum. The upholstery was worn out on the 2 front seats but the rear seat was and still is original. The Ten has a Holden body numbered 602 and was built at Woodville about 1 km from where I now live (& went to high school).

The Austin 10 has been 5/7th of my life and I still enjoy driving it - The Ten (I have never given it a name) has been extremely reliable. The odometer now reads over 120,000 miles indicating that I have driven it for 90,000 miles in 50 years, still not a high average of 1,800 miles per annum. I used to drive it to work very regularly from 1965 to 1998 and was often seen parked outside the Customs House at Port Adelaide. Ian Motley spotted me in 1974 driving into the ICI Oval at Largs for an annual Customs Vs Customs Agents Sports Day (he worked at Port Carriers a Customs Agency). In May 1974 I joined the Austin 7 Club and have never looked back and enjoyed the camaraderie of all involved since.

If anyone else has a milestone to report with their Austin please let me know for inclusion in future editions of the Club Journals.

Beware the on-line car sales scammers

If you are selling a car, or any other item for that matter, beware of the on-line car scammers. They work like this. On the first day your ad is posted you receive an email claiming it is just what they have been looking for, but unfortunately they are working on an off-shore oil rig (or something similar) and have no phone contact (they had left their satellite phone at home base etc.). They do not attempt to get a better price or have anyone who can look at your car but are more than happy to pay your asking price. They will then say that they live in Darwin or New Zealand or some other distant place but it is ok as they will arrange a courier to make all transport arrangements and then pick up the car when funds have been cleared. Sounds good so far but now for the scam. The next e-mail says "Was just about to transfer funds when the courier said that I will have to pay for the courier costs (usually somewhere around \$1000 to \$2000) before they can schedule a pick-up time etc.." The courier's corporate international headquarters is in China (or India or Indonesia etc.) and payment needs to be made through Western Union money transfer. They then say that because they are unable to use their credit card facilities that if YOU would make this payment they would add this cost onto your

asking price when they transfer funds. By now you are thinking maybe something is a little fishy here but the bad guys have not yet given up. Next comes an e-mail stating that the money (asking price and courier costs) has been paid into Pay-Pal and will be credited to your account once they have received the money you have paid to Western Union. This is on

'official looking' Pay-Pal documentation. The e-mail contains the address (in China or India etc.) where the Western Union money is to be sent. The e-mail also claims that the money deposited with them cannot be returned to the buyer (very untrue) and if you do not pay the transport costs they will take LEGAL ACTION (spelt out in capitals) against you. The bad guys hope that the official looking Pay-Pal e-mail will convince you that money is waiting to be transferred to your account and secondly that the threat of legal action will convince you to send the transport costs through the Western Union money transfer system. Time to pull the plug and ignore all of the

It is not only older folk who have been caught by this scam. I know of one young man who fell for this scam when he advertised his surfboard for sale. He lost around \$200 on the bogus

transfer costs. My son in law a few years ago advertised his Aprillia motor bike for sale and he got an e-mail supposedly from a lady in England very keen to buy the bike and then the transport costs scam appeared and he immediately bailed out. Many may know of this scam but for those who have not heard of it I hope this article has made you aware. And also the bogus buyer is usually a woman as I think (or they think) women are more trustworthy.

She learned to drive a car when 12 years old and then learnt to ride a motorbike. She was also a very good sportsperson and represented Ireland in hockey. But she had always loved motors and this was her destiny.

Shortly after buying her first bike she convinced an uncle to enter her in the 'Southern Scots Scramble', a cross country event covering 48 miles. How did she go? She won such was her determination to succeed. With this success achieved she approached motorcycle manufacturers for support but none were forthcoming because of limited female appeal. However she did gain employment in the showrooms of Rudge motorcycles in Birmingham. Fay continued to excel in trials and scrambles but then she discovered the new speedway scene. Having attended an event she knew this is what she also wanted to do. She obtained a bike and went to enter an event. Her entry was refused. She tried to enter two more times but again her entry was refused.



achievements).

It was now time for the Isle of Mann T.T. races and all of the 'officials' headed over to this event. This was the opportunity that Fay needed as she took her bike to the Crystal Palace speedway track and practiced and practiced. The result was that when the 'officials' returned she was able to demonstrate her proficiency. So she was allowed to enter and she immediately became a star. Fay defeated established champions from England and other countries and also established track records at various venues. (It would take a lot of space to detail all of her







Now was the time for a new challenge and that challenge would be racing in Australia. Using her own funds she packed her bikes and headed 'down under'. She became the first foreign rider to race speedway in Australia. Arriving in Perth her first challenge was to race W.A. Champion and International rider Sig Schlam. This she did by defeating Sid on his home Perth track. More acclaim was achieved when she defeated the S.A. champion Dick Wise at Adelaide's Speedway Royale track at Wayville. (Frank Lietchfield was also in this event and both Dick and Frank went on to be Adelaide engineering icons). On to the eastern states where more success was achieved before heading over to New Zealand. This made her the first foreign rider to ride there. Fay again showed her brilliance by defeating the NZ ace, Alf Matson. This was early 1929 and an interesting footnote is that whilst in NZ Fay received a ticket for speeding but she left the country before paying the fine. However when she returned to NZ in 1953 the Traffic Officers of the day presented her again with the speeding ticket.

Back home to England after a very successful tour 'down under'. Fay's next foray was to enter the International Six Day Trial on a 500 cc 'slopey' Panther. Anyone who has ridden one of these 'old' British bikes will know how un-wieldy they are and here was Fay riding this bike across five countries, mainly on mountain passes and tracks on a six day trial.

Then it was time for the next speedway season but the promoters dropped a bomb shell when they banned all female competitors. They were worried about the public backlash should a lady be seriously injured or worse. This curtailed Fay's English season but ladies were still permitted to give 'demonstrations' and attempt track records. This Fay did and set a new track record at the famous Wembley Stadium track. But the competition had gone and a new challenge was sought. This came in the form of car racing.



With females now banned from speedway racing Fay turned to cars for her thrills. Brooklands was the place to be and driving a Talbot 105 she won at an average speed of 107.8 mph. The following year at the same track she finished second this time lapping at 113.97 mph in a 2.6 litre Monza Alfa Romeo. She loved this so much that after the race she continued to circulate the track at very high speed for several more laps and only stopped when the flagman stepped out in front of her. (Brave guy). She was fined and disqualified but she was still

smiling. In 1934 Fay returned to Ireland and won the Leinster Trophy road race driving an Adler Trumpf. She was the only lady in the race. She was also the only lady entrant when she drove a works Aston Martin in the Italian Mille Miglia. The following years saw Fay competing at various events in many countries, including

Ireland, England, Italy, Sweden, India and South Africa. Her most notable drive prewar was when she drove a Freddy Dixon tuned Riley in the 1938 South African Grand Prix where she received a hero's welcome for her spirited driving performing before the car died.

The war years were a dark period of Fay's life. She was influenced by British Fascist leader Oswald Mosley, (who incidentally was the father of controversial former F1 big wig Max Mosley), and was included in the membership of the British Union of Fascists and as such was firstly interned in England before being sent to neutral Ireland until war's end. Following the war Fay worked in Ireland selling farm machinery but fate soon had her back in the motor racing scene. In 1949 she was asked to go to Hollywood and sell Jaguar and MG cars. This she accepted and it was not long after she arrived that she discovered the sport of midget car racing on dirt tracks. Shortly after she was competing where the commentators would call her 'Lady Leadfoot'. After a few years racing in the U.S. she was off again to Australia and New Zealand to race midgets.








She raced the Australian and NZ circuits in the early 1950's. She competed at Rowley Park in 1952 (possibly in Satan Brewer's Ford V8-60 powered midget, but I am not a 100% sure. I was only 7 years old then.) She was a hot shot mixing it with the local stars at all the tracks she raced. She upset NZ ace Snow Morris by beating him two out of three in a match race series. On paper Snow's V8-60 powered midget was superior to the Rugby powered midget Fay was loaned. This girl could drive and she continued to show this where ever she raced. In the late 1950's Fay returned to England where she continued to race. It is reported that she raced sedans at Brands Hatch around 1958 and then went on to race a



500 cc Cooper around Britain for several more years. Fay finally retired from racing in the 1960's.



This short article cannot cover all the motoring exploits this amazing lady experienced. Much more detail about Fay is in a book 'Fay Taylour - Queen of Speed'. I had read this book about a year ago. I borrowed it from an old motorbike racer mate but when I asked to re-borrow it for this article he told me he had lent it to someone but he could not remember who Fay Taylour was a very pretty girl. She is described as having auburn hair, laughing Irish eyes and a very nice figure. She did not marry but had several serious romances. One was to a very well to do English bike rider with whom she toured the International motorcycle race meetings with. But this man's family did not think that Fay had the 'social

status' to marry their son so the relationship was ended and the man went on to marry a 'society girl'. Another serious relationship was with an Australian farmer

Laurie's page of Stuff. The ramblings of an old man:

with whom she met on her tours to Australia. I think he proposed to her but she could not see herself settling down on an Australian farm. (These were a couple of facts I wanted to confirm from the book).

She often said "If I had to choose between a man and a race car I'd choose a race car every time. A man will pall after a time but a race car is always a challenge."

When Fay first went car racing she drove in a jumper and tweed skirt. This later gave way to tailored powder blue overalls which always had lipstick in the pockets. Her racing kit also included a pair of silk pyjamas in case she was injured and needed to go to hospital. Early in her career she had the misfortune of going to hospital and could not stand the course hospital gown.

Fay was in Adelaide in early 1954 and in fact took part in speedboat racing at Snowden's Beach on January 4th. Fay was the 'racing passenger' in a speedboat driven by a Mrs. Grace Walker from NSW. (This meeting was also Kym Bonython's first meeting in 'Bullo bee' and the meeting was witnessed by 8,500 people, of which I was one.)

After Fay retired she went to live at Blandford in Dorset where she passed away on August 2nd 1983.
