Run Sheet for Hills Luncheon Sunday 16 July 2017



Meet at Caffe Buongiorno, Hilltop, 93 South Road O'Halloran Hill for morning coffee anytime after 10.00am.

Leaving at approx 11.00 am head south along South Road and turn left at Kenihans Road.

Slower cars please leave earlier. It will take about one hour to cover distance.

Follow this road in an easterly direction through 2 roundabouts (right at the first one, straight on through the second) and head uphill on Chandlers Hill Road, turning right down Grants Gully Road to Clarendon.

NEW RULES FOR VEHICLES ON CONDITIONAL HISTORIC VEHICLE REGISTRATION SCHEME (CHVRS) IN SOUTH AUSTRALIA as from 1 July 2017 Now called "CLUB REGISTRATION"

About 8 months ago the SA Government announced a consultation period within the Historic Vehicle movement seeking comment on proposed changes to the CHVRS. The Austin 7 Club in SA as a recognised club provided its comments to the Government in February.

On 9 May 2017 changes to the Motor Vehicles (Conditional Registration) Variation Regulation 2017 were Gazetted. Regulation 15 was changed with the reintroduction of the rolling 30 year of age eligibility rule. Regulation 16 was changed whereby the scheme also provides for the inclusion of vehicles built or modified in accordance with requirements or specifications accepted by the Registrar. The new Regulations approved by Cabinet came into operation on 1 July 2017.

One major change which affects members with an existing vehicle registered under the CHVRS, is the requirement for them to no longer submit an annual Statutory Declaration. All other log book requirements remain as previous, ie club membership must remain current and the log book is endorsed regarding any day journeys.

The Austin 7 Club may see an increase in club membership from people wishing to Conditionally Register their vehicles that were manufactured prior to 31 December 1987 and which were outside the guidelines of the previous scheme, only time will tell.

VALE - Norman GRACE





The following is an article written by Jeanette Walker and along with her husband, Ken, have visited Winton Historic Races annually over the past 25 years. They are members of the Canberra Antique and Classic Motor Club Inc and this article appears in their club magazine.

41st HISTORIC WINTON 27-28 MAY 2017

Our 25th annual pilgrimage to Winton Victoria was in fog for the first hour. The usual coffee breaks were made at Gundagai, then Holbrook. Travel time in the Mirage to Wangaratta was reduced by two hours compared to the A40 Sports speed average of 80 kmp.

At Winton every year variations are made for display themes. This year a very early 1898 Massey-Harris bicycle and Ken Dunne's 1912 Willys Overland, a superb car, attracted much interest in the Transport themed vintage area.

An Austin 7 Extravaganza, Competition paddock, Vintage motorbikes, Observed Section Mud Trials Demonstration, Shannons Classic Car Show, Steam Engine Display and Special Display vehicles provided plenty to look at apart from the racing.

PAST EVENTS GOING BACK A BIT

On a weekend in October in the mid seventies the Austin 7 Club went to Stansbury on the Yorke Peninsula, here is the line-up of the Austins and one Morris on the foreshore. Other members were mentioned in the write-up in the October 1975 Journals, but this looks like the only formal photograph taken with drivers and their cars.



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In the early 1920's a new car appeared in the showrooms - the Austin Seven. We will visit a family who has just bought one.

'Are you pleased with your new car, Mr. Brown?' 'Delighted!' It's not very big, is it? It's just right for us. My wife and I sit in the front. We lift the two children over the seats and put them in the back where they are out of harm's way. I know a farmer who drives his fat wife to market in his Austin Seven, and he takes two large friends as well. The engine just about copes, but the body of his car is beginning to crack. It's his own fault. He puts too much strain on his car.'

'How fast does she go?' 'Once we went over fifty miles an hour, but it frightened my wife so I haven't tried that again. The car nips up hills Richer motorists easily. laugh at the Austin Seven and call it a "bath tub on wheels" or a "motorized pram", but we often overtake bigger cars. We wave at them as we go past! If you have paid £500 for a car it upsets you to be passed by one that only costs £165!



'Do you have any trouble

with it?' Well, I have to watch the oil pressure. I keep an eye on that little knob. If it sticks out I have to stop the car, take out four little plugs and poke some holes clean with a bit of wire. It doesn't take long, and hasn't happened often. No, we can rely on our Austin Seven to take us anywhere.'

'What do you think of the car, Mrs. Brown?' 'I can't tell you how pleased I am. My husband used to talk about buying a motor bike and sidecar, but you would never

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get me on a pillion in all winds and weathers. I wouldn't like the children cooped up together in a sidecar, either. They would certainly be uncomfortable and they wouldn't be able to talk to us. We often looked longingly at the cars in the showrooms but we never thought we'd be able to afford one. Now, we can go out every weekend, either into the country or to the seaside. We are going on holiday in it this summer. Think how much easier it will be than on the train!'



'It's good for my work too,' adds Mr. Brown. 'I don't have to cycle or catch the bus, so I am home much earlier than before. In fact, we are thinking of buying a new house, right out of town. It will be much nicer for the family, and I will be able to drive to my office quite easily.'

'Do you drive, Mrs. Brown?' 'I

tried once, but after what my husband said to me, never again!' 'She had trouble with the clutch!' explains Mr. Brown. 'She just couldn't let the clutch pedal out smoothly enough. She made the car jump like a kangaroo. Goodness knows what damage she did. She nearly shook the children out of the back seat.'

Now we will visit Mr. Upton, who helps to make Austin Sevens. 'Where do you work Mr. Upton?' 'At Longbridge, near Birmingham. It is hard to believe there was only a



derelict factory there less than twenty years ago. I joined the firm when Sir Herbert Austin started it. We only made Austin Twenties then. Beautiful cars they are, but expensive. During the Great War we had to go over

to making munitions. Of course the plant covered acres of ground by then. There were over 20,000 of us working there at one time. Soon after the War ended, when the big cars didn't sell any more, it looked as if we were going to lose our jobs. Then Sir Herbert had this bright idea of making a cheap, little car that ordinary folk could buy. Everyone laughs at the Austin Sevens, but they sell like hot cakes!'

But Austin Sevens could do more than take a family out for a weekend drive. In August 1978, holiday makers on the roads of Scotland were surprised to see convoys of Austin Sevens, many still in good condition, heading towards the town of Fort William. About eighty of the old cars were making their way to a special rally in the town, which is at the foot of Ben Nevis, the highest mountain in Great Britain.

Fifty years before, a Mr. George Simpson drove to the top of Ben Nevis, in an Austin Seven fitted with a specially low first gear. The car reached the top in 7 hours, 23 minutes and came down again in 1 hour, 55 minutes a time which still stands in the *Guinness Book of Records*. This was a great triumph for the little Austin. Even today, no other ordinary car has ever reached the top of Bev Nevis.

A NOTE FROM STAN GAFNEY



During the last century, I was, for a couple of years, responsible for the club spares activity. During my tenure, I was approached by the late Charlie Adams who advised that he had some "some bits" to pass into club spares. Among the "bits" was a circa June 1925 chassis frame, crankcase and block with what transpired to be matching works numbers. These numbers were stamped

into the rear chassis cross member. This was a eureka moment and I duly purchased the items from club spares, thinking that this could form the basis of a suitable retirement project. Well, it seemed to be a good idea at the time.

Over the ensuing years I straightened the chassis rails, replaced the slack rivets in the frame, and set about finding appropriate 1925 parts, including axles, wheels, 6" brakes, the very desirable belt driven speedo drive and the rare proprietary Hartford shock absorbers which Herbert Austin had "bought in" prior to making his own, much simplified version. In the end, I had to make the Hartford shocks from scratch, using sketches and photos provided by an ex fellow apprentice and Austin 7 enthusiast in the UK, Michael Darvell, who had tracked some originals. As you would imagine, this exercise kept me off the streets.

Sadly, my Dad's prophecy, that I had "too many irons in the fire", proved to be true:

the restored rolling chassis had to go. It was acquired by Kevin Haley, who quickly added an existing ex-Ron Burchett 1925 body, and transformed the whole into a very desirable two seater motor car.

I would like to acknowledge support of all those fellow club members who supported me in this madcap venture, together with extensive e-mailed technical specification advice from both UK based A7 Archivist Phil Baildon and Pram Hood Registrar David Cochrane.
