

Thank you to all who have helped around the club in 2023, repairing, painting and in the garden and yard area.





## 50 years of the Austin 7 run to Ayers Rock & Return in 21 days

50 years ago on Saturday morning the 1<sup>st</sup> of June 1974, three Austin 7's assembled outside the State Administrative Centre on the slip road on the north-eastern side of Victoria Square. A small crowd of well-wishers gathered, along with the potential drivers of the Austin 7's who were Ian Jones, Ian Motley and Gwilyn Henry-Edwards.

As reported in the Austin 7 Journals number 45 of July 1974, the trio were flagged off by the Chief Secretary, Mr. Kneebone.

A reproduction of the 1974 Ayers Rock report and the re-enactment in 2024 will appear in the July 2024 Journals

The re-enactment of this departure which will take place from the same location outside the State Administration Centre 198 Victoria Square is by no co-incidence, in 2024, the 1<sup>st</sup> of June, also a Saturday.



## Swan Hill Border Run 2024

13th to 16th Sept, 2024





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In 2023, the Austin 7 Club celebrated its 70<sup>th</sup> Anniversary. A couple of events were held during the year including our run to Marree and the Farina Bakery in June and a display day held on the 15<sup>th</sup> October at the Clubrooms. At the luncheon, part of the day speeches from Barry Frost and our patron, Hon Stephen Mullighan were made. Below is a transcript of Barry's presentation.

"WELCOME TO YOU ALL. This year the Austin 7 Club of SA Inc is celebrating its 70th year. I will speak on three things that the club has done which are worthy of mention.

## 1 - The TIMING TEAM

From our beginning in 1953, Austin 7 Club Members ran cars in sprints, races and other competitive events. SO, due to demand, in August 1960, we organised our FIRST race meeting at PT Wakefield.

BUT to run a race meeting, you need a timing team and stop watches. A team was formed and .....

FORTUNATELY, one of our members was a qualified watchmaker and he built a large clock which timed with a sweeping hand to 1 second. It was mounted on the track edge at Start/Finish line, in view for the timekeepers. This proved so successful that from then on we were hired by the Sporting Car Club to time their events. As cars became more competitive, timing accuracy increased from 1 sec, to 0.5, to 0.1, to 0.01 and to the current 0.0001 secs. The now redundant big clock was displayed at the Birdwood Motor Museum for a time, and is now on display on the wall of the spares shed.

Since that 1960 August date, we have timed events for cars, bikes, karts – at Club, State and National levels in SA and interstate. These included every F1GP at Adelaide and Melbourne until 2019; and every NASCAR meeting at Calder Thunderdome for 10 years from 1985 and every Supercar meeting in Adelaide until 2019; and other categories National and International meetings, also in SA, Interstate and Overseas.

So by the last meeting for 2023 on 5th November, the total is **971.** 

Thanks to my team for earning many thousands of dollars for our Club!

#### 2 - THE PURCHASE OF THESE CLUBROOMS

For our first 20 years, general meetings were held in various locations, generally in the Eastern suburbs, but by then we were looking for something of our own ... A search began for a suitable site, and eventually this one was found; a deposit was paid and on 24 March 1974 we officially moved in!! Then in March 1987, after super-human fund raising efforts, we paid off the loan, so **they now really were ours!** 

#### 3- THE SPARES FOR Austin 7s

So far I've deliberately not named anyone - BUT Names are necessary here!!

Pre 1971, when the club was meeting at the Westbourne Park Memorial Hall, Ian Motley, who was working for Port Carriers as a customs agent, started to purchase spares on behalf of members from suppliers in England. The spares would be ordered one month and then supplied to the members at the next meeting. This was a good turnaround considering freight and payment systems that were available back in the day.

Charlie Adams, who was a spare parts interpreter in his job, then took over and with Bruce Bridgart's help, had stock at his home for members to purchase. When the club moved to these clubrooms in 1974, the tennis court shed became the spares shed.


Graham Burge took over in 1979 and the third Monday night of the month was used for the sale of spare parts. Stan Gafney took over in 1985 and at some meetings the turnover was \$600. Dave Hall took over in 1990 and the spares moved into an ATCO hut, as the white ants were taking over the tennis court shed! David Grear was next in line in 2000 and continues in this role today. Spares moved to the new shed in 2012 and have already expanded once since then.

The Spares service has thus been the lifeblood of the continued success of our name-sake.... the AUSTIN 7.

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#### AUSTIN 7 CLUB - 4 WD TOUR OF THE COORONG

<u>Friday 27<sup>th</sup> October:</u> We dropped our Jack Russell off to our son's house and via Tailem Bend we headed toward Meningie with one "oh no!" moment when the engine of our beloved Discovery shut down with dashboard lights flashing. Once realising that our navigator dog had slipped off his perch on the centre console and must have touched the 'MODE' button we were soon on our way again. We booked into The Waterfront Motel and headed to the Meningie Golf Club to join other early arrivals for a great dinner.

<u>Saturday 28<sup>th:</sup></u> We met the rest of the runners at the Lions Park by the lake to receive our numbers, show bag with map and information sheet then headed off in convoy just after 10am, at first toward Coonalpyn but soon turned off to follow The Alexander Tolmer Gold Escort Route along secondary roads then fire tracks, passing huge farm paddocks to Mount Boothby Conservation Park where we pulled in for lunch and set up near a very disgusted stumpy-tail lizard. Bouncing along merrily following the fire track and the car in front, along the edge of the Messant Conservation Park. We came out at the Salt Creek Café van where 34 plus people arriving at once nearly overwhelmed the poor chap left to make and serve the coffee and muffins. From here it was a smooth run to Kingston and the Lacepede Bay Motel where a sedate "happy hour" was held on the lawn by the pool before walking around to the Royal Mail Hotel where we took over the dining room and all enjoyed a great evening.

Sunday 29<sup>th:</sup> An early start for a big day saw the Austin 7 Club's new fold-up barbecue set up on the lawn and our chief guide and chef Andrew and his crew cooked our bacon and eggs breakfast as the motel no longer runs a dining room. We all met at the Jetty before heading off to Long Beach for an exhilarating run along 9 miles of pristine coastline noting that the tide was slowly but surely coming in, until we reached "The Granites", three huge oblong lumps of rock on the edge of the beach topped with shags, gulls and other waterbirds. Now the test – the climb out - with one by one doing a flat out run through deep sand up off the beach to the carpark with a cheer going up from the front runners as each car made it. Poor Laurie and Pam stopped mid run but backed down and made it on the second go. We heard later that it took three goes for the leading red vehicle to make it. It was great fun all round.

Off along the Old Coorong Road through gates normally locked, we were lucky to visit the lovely old CANTARA HOMESTEAD where the group photo was taken. Getting 18 4WD's into a shot is harder than 18 Austins. From the front porch Peter Doolete told us the history of the house and the area before we walked through the house and grounds and took in the huge sandhill between the house and the beach. Once the gates were unlocked again we headed along the Princes Highway to 42 mile Crossing for lunch in the shade of a lovely shelter with nesting swallows under the roof. Once more the barbecue came into use, but struggled this time with the number of sausages etc. loaded on the hot plate.



Off back to Salt Creek and once again Andrew had the key to the gate to get us in for a lovely drive through the Martin Washpool Conservation Park where we followed seldom used overgrown tracks through beautiful natural wetland now being rejuvenated after years of water from the Grampians being diverted to the sea through drains. All cars now have had the dust removed and their bellies clean. We saw the lake from a distance but were unable to reach it, still it was well worth seeing and we thank you Andrew for being able to get us into places few people ever

see. It was a fantastic weekend and you and Debbie did a wonderful job.

After an ice cream each at the Salt Creek Café we bade farewell and headed back for the dog and home, tired but happy.

## Austin 7 Club visits the Coorong.

Approximately 20 people gathered at the Lake Albert Golf Club in Meningie for tea on Friday 27<sup>th</sup> of October. The group consisted of locals and Austin 7 Club members which were about to embark on the first ever 4WD event run by the Austin 7 Club. After a lovely meal the group dispersed for the evening ready to meet other fellow members on the Saturday before touring the Coorong Region.

Saturday morning (28 October), 4WD tour participants were to meet at the shelter in the Meningie Lions Park however this didn't happen as Coorong District Council is upgrading the Shelter area, so we met opposite Happy Daise Café in the main street. Thirty-Four participants lined up to register for the event with 19 vehicles, all vehicles were given an information pack which included a map with the proposed route for the day highlighted.

Local guides for the trip were Peter and Lisa Doolette, Paul, and Sandy Fiebig, along with Andrew and Debbie Dawes.

The group departed Meningie shortly after 10.00am and headed out on the Coonalpyn Road and then making their way to Boothby Conservation Park where they followed the fire track on the eastern side of the park. Here there were several wildflowers along the edge of the park.

Boothby Rocks was our next port of call where we had a picnic lunch, and the group viewed the nearby granite rocks. After lunch Peter and Lisa gave a brief talk on a couple of bush tucker plants close by.

Messent Conservation Park was next with about 19 klm of sand track and a variety of native vegetation with Alf flat having extensive Banksia Flats. On leaving Messent we travelled past the entrance to the property Currawong which was owned in the 1960's and part of the 1970's by a Mr Bob Hawkes who was a keen conservationist and in 1973 hosted Prince Philip for an overnight stay while the Queen opened the Sydney Opera House.

Salt Creek was next with a stop at Sarah and Mandell's "Salt Creek Café" for a coffee and a Muntries Muffin. From here we travelled directly to Kingston and settled in at the Lacepede Bay Motel and for some, a happy hour to relax before dining at the Royal Mail Hotel just around the corner.

Sunday morning (29 October), saw us up early for an egg and bacon sandwich on the lawns of the Motel courtyard, (thanks to John and Beck for the eggs). After breakfast we assembled at the Kingston Jetty before heading to Long Beach where we travelled along the beach for approximately 15klm to the Granites. Even though the tide was low the water was higher than I expected, and we decided to park on the bitumen carpark rather than the beach.

Coorong National Parks had kindly allowed us access to Cantara Homestead site, on arrival Peter Doolette gave us a bit of history on the Homestead. Many took the opportunity to have



a walk through the lovely old building before enjoying morning tea.

Another picnic lunch was next, but this time we were at the 42 Mile Crossing. David Grear gave a bit of a talk here about the time about 25 years ago when the Austin 7 Club visited 42 Mile Crossing and he drove a 1928 Ford A truck (now owned by Greg Rowett) across the Young Husband Peninsula. At that time the club was staying at Gemini Downs for the weekend.

After lunch we headed back to Salt Creek where Andrew explained where the water came, and Peter highlighted some of the history of the Martin Washpool Conservation Park. After about an hour of driving and sightseeing through the Park, we paid another visit to Sarah and Mandell's roadside café for an ice cream before most people said their goodbyes before heading off home. A dozen hard core A7 members dined at Freshie's Sunday evening before heading home on Monday.


